IMPORTANT BILLS TO WATCH

The environmental community’s top priorities are:

	<p>HB 70/HB 72: Protecting the Green Infrastructure Budget Committee Hearing: Ongoing Committee Hearings in Appropriations SUPPORT</p> <p>Every dollar Maryland invests in protecting our environment saves good jobs today and creates more good jobs tomorrow. We are gravely concerned about the “zeroing out” of any environmental programs. Specifically, we must protect funding for Program Open Space, the Chesapeake Bay Trust Fund and Bay Restoration Fund, and the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI) Programs; and we oppose cuts to funding for our Agriculture, Energy, Environment, Natural Resources, and Planning agencies. As the General Assembly once again works to make difficult decisions due to the challenging economy, we are closely watching budget cuts and revenue generating mechanisms.</p>
	<p>HB 1034: Clean the Streams and Beautify the Bay Act Sponsor: Delegate Carr SUPPORT</p> <p>Establishes a five-cent fee for single-use plastic and paper bags distributed at stores, with the proceeds to be split among the retailers, the Chesapeake Bay Trust for environmental restoration projects, and program administration and enforcement.</p>
	<p>HB 852: Marcellus Shale Safe Drilling Act Sponsor: Delegate Mizeur Committee Hearing: February 23, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT</p> <p>Establishes a moratorium on the issuance of permits for drilling natural gas wells until there is a comprehensive assessment of the direct and cumulative impacts of hydraulic fracturing.</p>
	<p>HB 1054: Maryland Offshore Wind Energy Act Sponsors: Speaker Busch (By Request of Governor O’Malley), Delegate Hucker Committee Hearing: March 3, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Economic Matters SUPPORT</p> <p>The United Steelworkers and environmental groups are joined in support of offshore wind legislation. The legislation will require the Public Service Commission (PSC) to negotiate long-term contracts of up to 25 years between Maryland utilities and offshore wind generating companies. The bill will also direct the PSC to consider long-term price stability, environmental and public health benefits, and other factors when determining approval of the long-term contracts. Satisfying a modest portion of each large electricity supplier’s load with offshore wind power will lock in stable energy prices. A second bill will encourage in-state manufacturing of offshore wind turbine components, creating much-needed jobs in Maryland.</p>

In addition to our four priority issues and bills, we are working on a number of other bills this session. We are still in the early part of the session; therefore the list below is not comprehensive. 	<p>HB 164: Demand Response Pilot Program for Charging Electric Vehicles Sponsor: President Miller (By Request of the Administration) Committee Hearing: March 3, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Economic Matters <i>SUPPORT</i> SB 179 establishes a demand response pilot program for charging electric vehicles by June 30, 2013.</p>

	<p>HB 167: Maryland Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Council Sponsor: Speaker Busch (By Request of the Administration) Committee Hearing: Already Heard <i>SUPPORT</i> Establishes the Maryland Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Council to submit an interim and a final report.</p>
	<p>HB 177: Septics Sponsor: Delegate Lafferty Committee Hearing: February 16, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters <i>SUPPORT</i> Requires alternatives to septic systems in major new developments by requiring that major new subdivisions include technology to treat sewage waste before it is discharged.</p>
	<p>HB 179: Apartment Building Recycling Sponsor: Delegate Lafferty Committee Hearing: February 16, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters <i>SUPPORT</i> Requires owners or managers of apartment buildings or condominiums to provide recycling for residents.</p>
	<p>HB 273: Natural Resources—Oyster Poaching Hearings Sponsor: Delegate Gilchrist Committee Hearing: February 16, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters <i>SUPPORT</i> Complements the Governor's 2010 oyster initiative by directing DNR to conduct an administrative hearing for anyone who receives a citation for oyster poaching.</p>
	<p>HB 341: Plastic Bag Recycling Sponsors: Delegates Niemann and Lafferty Committee Hearing: February 16, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters <i>SUPPORT</i> Mandates that retail stores sell alternative bags and provide plastic bag recycling.</p>

	<p>HB 347: Environment—Nitrogen Removal Technology—Evaluation and Ranking Sponsor: Delegate Lafferty Committee Hearing: February 16, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters <i>SUPPORT</i> Clarifies how Maryland Department of the Environment ranks septic system technology based on nitrogen removal and cost effectiveness to assist counties and consumers in purchasing decisions.</p>
NEW THIS WEEK	<p>HB 57: Bay Restoration Fund Sponsors: Delegate Costa <i>SUPPORT</i> Authorizes specified fee revenue collected for the Bay Restoration Fund to be used to pay the cost of connecting properties served by onsite sewage disposal systems to specified existing municipal wastewater facilities under specified circumstances; and establishing conditions for the funding of specified costs.</p>
	<p>HB 687: Chesapeake Bay Nitrogen Reduction Act of 2011 Committee Hearing: March 9, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters Sponsor: Delegate Bobo <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>HB 706: Chesapeake Bay Phosphorus Reduction Act of 2011 Committee Hearing: March 9, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters Sponsor: Delegate Clagett <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>HB 573: Fertilizer Use Act of 2011 Sponsors: Sponsors: Delegates Hubbard and Wood Committee Hearing: March 9, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>Lawn Fertilizer (3 bills): The first bill requires that fertilizers contain a percentage of "bay-friendly" nitrogen, that rules for professional fertilizer applicators reflect bay clean up goals, and more consumer education materials are distributed with fertilizers. The second bill bans phosphorus from fertilizers. The third bill establishes nitrogen and phosphorus standards for fertilizer applications, requires certification of professional applicators, and regulates sales.</p>
	<p>HB 754: Arsenic in Chicken Feed Sponsor: Delegate Hucker Committee Hearing: March 2, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters <i>SUPPORT</i> Prohibits the use, sale, or distribution of poultry feed that contains roxarsone or any other feed additive that contains arsenic.</p>
	<p>HB 718: Commercial Building Disclosure Sponsor: Delegate McIntosh Committee Hearing: March 10, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>HB 719: Residential Building Disclosure Sponsor: Delegate McIntosh Committee Hearing: March 10, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>Building Energy Disclosure (2 bills): These bills require their relevant categories of buildings to publicly disclose their energy to use to the public, prospective buyers and renters.</p>

	<p>HB 660: Pesticides: Use, Release, Purchase and Sales Reporting Sponsor: Delegate Frush Committee Hearing: March 2, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT Establishes a centralized reporting system--for both certified applicators' pesticide use and dealers' purchase and sales of restricted use pesticides--under Maryland Department of Agriculture for access by government agencies, scientists, and the public</p>
	<p>HB 668: Local Stormwater Charges Sponsor: Delegate Carr Committee Hearing: March 9, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT Requires state agencies to pay municipal and county governments stormwater utility fees if they own property in those localities where fees are assessed.</p>
New This Week	<p>HB 847: Environment—Permitting Process—Environmental Justice Review Sponsor: Delegate Mitchell Committee Hearing: March 9, 2011 at 1:00 pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT Requires the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene and the Commission on Environmental Justice and Sustainable Communities to develop maps that identify the locations of environmentally stressed communities; and requires permit applicants to the Maryland Department of the Environment to submit an Environmental Justice Review.</p>

	<p>HB 4: Bisphenol-A (BPA) Free Maryland Sponsor: Delegate Hubbard Committee Hearing: Already Heard SUPPORT Prohibits the manufacturing, sale, or distribution of baby food, infant formula, or other products intended for kids four and under, if the packaging contains BPA. The prohibition also includes reusable sports water bottles containing BPA.</p>
	<p>HB 759: Healthy Kids, Healthy Maryland Sponsor: Delegate Waldstreicher SUPPORT Establishes comprehensive chemical reform by giving the Maryland Department of the Environment the authority to regulate multiple chemicals of concern.</p>

	<p>HB 163: Tax Credit for Electric Vehicle Recharging Equipment Sponsor: Speaker Busch (By Request of the Administration) SUPPORT Allows a State income tax credit for 20% of the cost of qualified electric vehicle recharging equipment.</p>

	<p>HB TBD: Full Credit for Solar Energy Sponsor: Delegate McHale <i>SUPPORT</i> Ensures that people with solar panels get full credit for the power they generate, and that homeowners pay only for the energy they consume.</p>
	<p>HB TBD: High Performance Building Act Sponsor: Delegate McIntosh <i>SUPPORT</i> Expands the 2008 High Performance Buildings Act requiring LEED Silver Building Standards for capital projects that are funded solely or in part by a grant from the state.</p>
	<p>HB TBD: Incinerator Alternatives Act <i>SUPPORT</i> Focuses taxpayer dollars on jobs supporting renewable energy sources by explicitly prohibiting the building or expansion of incinerator facilities through siting criteria.</p>

	<p>HB TBD: Sustainable Energy Utility Framework Sponsor: Delegate Niemann <i>SUPPORT</i> Establishes a new sustainable energy utility framework to spur private financing for residential alternative energy generation.</p>

	<p>HB 766: Joint Committee on Transparency and Open Government Sponsor: Delegate Mizeur <i>SUPPORT</i> Establishes a legislative committee to coordinate State efforts to explore, develop, and implement open government and transparency policies for all branches of our state government.</p>
