IMPORTANT BILLS TO WATCH

The environmental community’s top priorities are:

	<p>HB 150/HB 151: Protecting the Green Infrastructure Budget Committee Hearing: Ongoing committee hearings in Appropriations <i>OPPOSE</i> - We urge you to reject DLS’s proposal to extend last year’s diversion of RGGI. <i>SUPPORT AS PROPOSED</i></p> <p>We must oppose cuts to Program Open Space, the Chesapeake Bay Trust Fund, the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI) Programs, the Heritage Structure Tax Credit (Historic Tax Credit) and protect funding for our Environment, Natural Resources, Agriculture, and Planning agencies.</p>
	<p>Smarter Transportation Choices for Maryland</p> <p>HB 282: Bicycle and Pedestrian Access Sponsor: Delegate Peña-Melnyk Committee Hearing: March 2 at 1pm in Judicial Proceedings</p> <p>HB 461: Three Foot Bicycle Safety Rule Sponsor: Delegate Cardin Committee Hearing: Already Heard</p> <p>HB 1155: Consolidated Transportation Program Sponsor: Delegate Lafferty Committee Hearing: March 2 at 1 pm in Ways and Means and March 9 at 2pm in Environmental Matters</p> <p>HB 1193: The Shoulder Rule Bill Sponsor: Delegate Carr Committee Hearing: March 9 at 1pm in Environmental Matters <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>In a time of scarce transportation dollars, we need to make sure we are investing state funds wisely. HB 1155 will establish smart growth criteria for funding transportation projects to make it easy for the state to choose proposals that ensure our transportation and land use decisions work together to provide more travel choices to Maryland citizens, especially for those who do not own cars. It will also reduce environmental damage from transportation projects and improve access to jobs. The other bills will make the roads safer for bicycling.</p>

	<p>HB 999: Watershed Protection and Restoration Act Sponsors: Delegates Huckler and Cardin Committee Hearing: March 10 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT</p> <p>In order to restore the health of the Chesapeake Bay, each city and county throughout the region needs funding to invest in its community to reduce the polluted runoff poisoning our waterways. This legislation will give these local jurisdictions a dedicated funding source by assessing a surcharge on impervious surfaces to clean up their rivers and the Bay, create green jobs, and leverage additional dollars from the state and federal government for watershed protection and restoration.</p>

Clagett OPPOSE</p> <p>HB 1409: Stormwater Management Sponsor: Delegate G. Clagett OPPOSE</p> <p>Stormwater Management (4 bills) - We oppose any rollbacks to the Stormwater Management regulations. Stormwater is the ONLY pollution source INCREASING loads to the Bay and its rivers. If we want healthy water, we have to step up reductions from development and redevelopment. Builders worry about their costs of meeting treatment requirements; however, it will cost more to retrofit after the fact. Developers can share the burden now, or taxpayers can foot the entire bill later. The regulations work as written since they allow ample flexibility for redevelopment projects to meet requirements in any number of ways.</p>
<p>Maryland LCV Priority</p>	<p>HB 522: Public Service Commission - Report on the State's Long-Term Energy Needs Sponsors: Delegates Manno and Hecht Committee Hearing: Already Heard SUPPORT</p> <p>Requires the Public Service Commission (PSC) to oversee the creation of a state energy plan that is consistent with all state environmental laws and to review proposals with respect to that state plan.</p>

	<p>HB 51: Real Property - Installation and Use of Clotheslines on Residential Property Sponsor: Delegate G. Clagett Committee Hearing: Already Heard <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>This bill encourages energy conservation by prohibiting communities from banning clotheslines on residential property.</p>
	<p>HB 70: Bay Restoration Fund – Expanded Uses of Funds Sponsor: Delegate McIntosh Committee Hearing: Already Heard <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>Recommended by the Bay Restoration Fund Advisory Committee to make the best use of the Bay Restoration Funds for local governments to use in their enhanced nutrient removal programs.</p>
	<p>HB 103: Mobile Home Parks - Plans for Dislocated Residents Sponsor: Delegate Lafferty Committee Hearing: Already Heard <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>This is a smart growth measure that requires better land use planning of the relocation of dislocated residents of mobile parks to encourage the continuation of their community.</p>
	<p>HB: 160: Estate Tax Exclusion for Family Farm in Preservation Sponsor: Delegate Malone Committee Hearing: Already Heard <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>HB 221: Estate Tax Exclusion for Qualified Agricultural Property Sponsor: Delegate Kullen Committee Hearing: Already Heard <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>Keep Farmers Farming (2 bills) - Many farm families are forced off their land when the parents die because of the burden of estate taxes; we support full relief for farmers from this tax. But in these fiscal times, we also support partial relief for those farmers who go the extra mile and preserve their property. Keeping farmers farming promotes smart growth and protects our open spaces.</p>
	<p>HB 169: Marilyn J. Praisner Safe and Earth-Friendly Roadway Act Sponsor: Delegate Carr Committee Hearing: Already Heard <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>This bill authorizes local jurisdictions to install safer, more energy efficient road lamps.</p>
	<p>HB 313: Bay Restoration Fund - Authorized Uses Sponsor: Delegate Costa Committee Hearing: Already Heard <i>SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS</i></p> <p>Reduces pollution by authorizing the Bay Restoration Fund to pay the cost of connecting properties served by onsite sewage disposal systems to existing municipal wastewater facilities.</p>

	<p>HB 349: Maryland Efficiency Standards Act – Televisions Sponsors: Delegates Carr and Bronrott Committee Hearing: Already Heard SUPPORT Saves energy and reduces global warming pollution by establishing minimum efficiency standards for televisions sold in Maryland.</p>
	<p>HB 351: Chesapeake Bay Restoration Consumer Retail Choice Act Sponsor: Delegate Carr Committee Hearing: March 10 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT Reduces waste and energy demands by establishing an customer credit for using reusable bags instead of disposable bags and establishing a fee on the use of disposable bags. A significant portion of the fee will go to the Chesapeake and Atlantic Coastal Bays 2010 Trust Fund.</p>
	<p>HB 446: Distribution of Telephone Directories - Customer Opt Out Sponsor: Delegate Stein Committee Hearing: Already Heard SUPPORT Requires a telephone company to provide customers with an opportunity to opt out of receiving telephone directories distributed by, or on behalf of, the telephone company.</p>
	<p>HB 468: Qualified Submerged Energy Lines Sponsor: Speaker Busch (By Request of Governor O’Malley) Committee Hearing: Already Heard SUPPORT This bill would help facilitate development of offshore wind energy off the coast of Maryland.</p>
	<p>HB 471: Renewable Energy Portfolio Standard – Solar Sponsor: Speaker Busch (By Request of Governor O’Malley) Committee Hearing: Already Heard SUPPORT Require a quicker ramp-up of the solar portion of the state’s renewable portfolio standard (RPS), which would jumpstart job creation and cut down on our emission of global warming pollution.</p>
	<p>HB 475: Sustainable Communities Act Sponsor: Speaker Busch (By Request of Governor O’Malley) Committee Hearing: March 9 at 12pm jointly in Ways and Means and Environmental Matters SUPPORT Reestablishes and alters the Maryland Heritage Structure Rehabilitation Tax Credit Program (a.k.a., the Historic Tax Credit) to be the Sustainable Communities Tax Credit Program.</p>
	<p>HB 527: Abandoned Vessels Sponsor: Delegate V. Clagett Committee Hearing: Already Heard SUPPORT Makes it easier for citizens and the Department of Natural Resources to remove abandoned boats.</p>
	<p>HB 624: Pharmaceutical Disposal Act Sponsor: Delegate V. Clagett Committee Hearing: Already Heard SUPPORT Reduces water pollution by requiring healthcare facilities to safely dispose of pharmaceuticals.</p>

HB 801 allows for customers to submit a written request of payment for surplus energy credits generated every quarter or year. HB 852 allows municipalities to transfer renewable energy credits for future renewable energy projects. HB 902 allows specified not-for-profit customers to transfer specified generation credits accrued from electricity produced from specified renewable sources to specified properties. These incentives will create a more robust market for energy generation.</p>
	<p>HB 705: State, County, and Municipal Buildings Sponsor: Delegate Stein Committee Hearing: March 3 at 1pm in Health and Government Operations <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>HB 985: Public and Commercial Buildings Sponsor: Delegate Hecht Committee Hearing: March 12 at 1pm in Economic Matters <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>Building Energy Disclosure (2 bills) - HB 705 requires that all government buildings publicly disclose building energy use; HB 985 adds an additional requirement for commercial building owners.</p>
	<p>HB 710: Blue Ribbon Commission on Maryland Transportation Funding Sponsor: Delegate Howard Committee Hearing: Already Heard <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>Establish a Blue Ribbon Commission to review, evaluate, and make recommendations on Maryland Transportation Funding.</p>
	<p>HB 716: Direct Wine Shipping Sponsors: Delegate Krysiak Committee Hearing: March 5 at 1pm in Economic Matters <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p>The bill supports sustainable farming practices and maintaining Maryland's farms and open spaces by promoting the sale of a growing agricultural product –Maryland wine. This bill would allow both wineries and retailers to ship up to 24 cases of wine to a Maryland resident per year.</p>

	<p>HB 763: Solar Drying Bill Sponsor: Delegate Montgomery Committee Hearing: March 4 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT</p> <p>Removes the prohibition of clotheslines or other outdoor laundry drying devices, but would allow condominiums, homeowners associations or housing cooperatives to adopt reasonable rules regarding the timing, placement, and manner of use of these devices.</p>
	<p>HB 827: Biomass and Biofuels - In-State Production Incentives Sponsor: Delegate Hubbard SUPPORT Committee Hearing: March 2 at 1pm in Economic Matters</p> <p>Allows farmers to receive revenue for surplus energy produced with biofuels and requires blending biofuels into transportation fuels to provide energy independence and cleaner water.</p>
	<p>HB 903: Road Salt Management Programs Sponsor: Delegate Kramer Committee Hearing: March 3 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT</p> <p>Road salt can have a significant impact in fresh water streams. This bill requires jurisdictions responsible for highway maintenance to establish and implement a best practices road salt management program.</p>
	<p>HB 922: The Renewables First Act Sponsor: Delegate Hecht Committee Hearing: March 9 at 1pm in Economic Matters SUPPORT</p> <p>Requires that Maryland first consider renewable energy for new electricity generation.</p>
	<p>HB 930: Fertilizer and Pesticide Reporting Sponsor: Delegate Frush Committee Hearing: March 3 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT</p> <p>Mandates tracking and geographic mapping of fertilizer and pesticide use.</p>
	<p>HB 943: Chesapeake Conservation Corps Sponsors: Delegate McIntosh Committee Hearing: March 12 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT WITH AMMENDMENTS</p> <p>The bill would establish a public-private volunteer service-based program that will train young adults for green-collar and community organizing jobs in environmental restoration, protection, energy conservation and education.</p>
	<p>HB 944: Recycling - Bars and Restaurants - Beverage Containers Sponsor: Delegate Niemann Committee Hearing: March 3 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT</p> <p>Establishes a program for recycling of specified beverage containers from bars and restaurants.</p>
	<p>HB 953: Agriculture - Commercial Feed - Arsenic Prohibition Sponsor: Delegate Hucker Committee Hearing: March 5 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT</p> <p>Prohibiting a person from using, selling, or distributing poultry feed that contains roxarsone or any other additive that contains arsenic.</p>

	<p>HB 982: Solid Waste Management - Recycling - Requirements Sponsor: Delegate Niemann Committee Hearing: March 10 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT Requires the creation of a statewide recycling plan and establishes recycling goals.</p>
	<p>HB 1014: Clean Energy Loans Sponsors: Delegates Hecht and Waldstreicher SUPPORT Committee Hearing: March 12 at 1pm in Economic Matters Gives cities and municipalities the ability to loan citizens money for solar or energy efficiency projects at very low interest rates, resulting in more access for homeowners.</p>
	<p>HB 1041: The Lead Paint Reduction Act of 2010 Sponsors: Delegate Waldstreicher Committee Hearing: March 11 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT Gives legal standing to neighborhood associations to sue on behalf of their members over damages from lead paint poisoning and makes current lead paint law consistent across the state.</p>
NEW THIS WEEK	<p>HB 1153: Lead Paint Dust Testing Bill Sponsor: Delegate Oaks Committee Hearing: March 5 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT This bill ensures that rental properties are tested for the presence of lead containing dust instead of the current visual testing method. This will help eliminate childhood lead poisoning.</p>
	<p>HB 1191: Natural Resources - Oyster Poaching – Hearing Sponsor: Delegate McIntosh Committee Hearing: March 12 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT This bill complements the Governor's oyster initiative by directing DNR to conduct an administrative hearing for anyone who receives a citation for oyster poaching.</p>
NEW THIS WEEK	<p>HB 1230: Task Force to Encourage Recycling and Reduce Litter in Maryland's Waterways Sponsor: Delegate Olszewski Committee Hearing: March 12 at 1pm in Environmental Matters Establishes a task force to develop strategies to encourage recycling and reduce litter in Maryland's waterways.</p>
	<p>HB 1360: Invasive Plants - Labeling and Notice Sponsor: Delegate Boteler Committee Hearing: March 12 at 1pm in Environmental Matters SUPPORT Discourages the introduction of invasive plants by requiring retailers to notify customers that invasive species sold could cause harm to the environment.</p>

	<p>HB 1040: High Performance Building Act Sponsor: Delegate Bronrott SUPPORT Expands the High Performance Buildings Act requiring LEED Silver Standard for capital projects that are funded solely or partly by a grant of state aid.</p>
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	<p>HB 1257: No-Discharge Designation for Maryland Waters Sponsor: Delegate Holmes (At the Request of the Attorney General) SUPPORT Reduces nutrient pollution by prohibiting boats from discharging treated and untreated sewage into the waters of the state.</p>
	<p>HB 1427: Incinerator Regulation Sponsor: Delegate Hucker SUPPORT Establishes criteria for the building, re-licensing, or re-permitting of an incinerator or waste-to-energy facility.</p>
	<p>HB TBD: Keep Coal Ash Out of Our Water SUPPORT Prohibits certain uses of coal ash and adds stricter requirements to prevent toxic dust from blowing in the wind.</p>
	<p>HB TBD: Long-Term Power Purchasing Agreements Sponsor: Delegate Hucker SUPPORT Requires the Public Service Commission to enter into long-term purchasing contracts with renewable energy sources.</p>

Open transparent government is critical to the Maryland LCV’s mission of holding legislators accountable. Therefore, we are tracking the following good governance bills this session:

	<p>HB 107: Legislative Voting Sunshine Act Sponsor: Delegate Ali SUPPORT Committee Hearing: March 1 at 2pm in Rules and Executive Nominations Requires that certain votes taken on a bill or amendments in a standing committee to be made available on the Maryland General Assembly website by a certain time.</p>
	<p>HB 344: Maryland Open Government Act Sponsor: Delegate Mizeur Committee Hearing: March 1 at 2pm in Rules and Executive Nominations SUPPORT Requires all standing committee votes be posted and accessible on the Maryland General Assembly website; requires additional measures to enable more public participation in General Assembly and Board of Public Works hearings.</p>
	<p>HB 1031: Open Meetings Bill Sponsors: Delegates O’Donnell and Mizeur SUPPORT Requires the State Open Meetings Law Compliance Board develop and offer an online training program on the requirements of the open meetings law to employees, officers, and members of the public.</p>

	<p>SB 3/HB 89: Wetlands and Waterways Program Fees Sponsor: Delegate O'Donnell HB 89 Floor Action: Passed Third Reader on House 138-0, Assigned to Education, Health and Environmental Affairs SB 3 Floor Action: Passed Third Reader 42-0, Assigned to Environmental Matters <i>SUPPORT</i> Exempting aquaculture activities for which the Department of Natural Resources has issued a specified permit from a requirement to pay application fees under the Wetlands and Waterways Program.</p>
	<p>SB 213/HB 33: Child Care Articles and Toys Containing Bisphenol-A (BPA) Sponsor: Delegate Hubbard HB 33 Floor Action: Passed Third Reader on House Floor 137-0, Assigned Finance SB 213 Floor Action: Passed Third Reader 46-0, Assigned Health & Government Operations <i>SUPPORT</i> Prohibits the manufacture, sale or distribution of toys or child care articles containing BPA; requiring the use of the least toxic alternative.</p>
