## IMPORTANT BILLS TO WATCH

The environmental community’s top priorities are:

	<p><b>SB 140/SB 141: Protecting the Green Infrastructure Budget</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Ongoing committee hearings in Budget &amp; Taxation</b>  <i><b>OPPOSE</b></i> - We urge you to reject the Department of Legislative Services’ proposals cut the 2010 Chesapeake and Atlantic Coastal Bays Trust Fund and limit remaining funds to cover crops, to extend last year’s diversion of RGGI, to repeal mandated funding for the Department of Natural Resources Fisheries Service, and to eliminate the Maryland Environmental Trust.  <b><i>SUPPORT AS PROPOSED</i></b>          We must oppose cuts to Program Open Space, the Chesapeake Bay Trust Fund, the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI) Programs, the Heritage Structure Tax Credit (Historic Tax Credit) and protect funding for our Environment, Natural Resources, Agriculture, and Planning agencies.</p>
	<p><b>SB 51: Three-Foot Bicycle Safety Bill</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Raskin</b>  <b>Floor Action: Third Reader Passed 43-0, Assigned to Environmental Matters</b>  <b>SB 624: The Shoulder Rule Bill</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Frosh</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <b>SB 760: Consolidated Transportation Program</b>  <b>Sponsors: Senators Pugh and Harrington</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 11 at 1pm in Budget and Taxation</b>  <b><i>SUPPORT</i></b>  <b>Smarter Transportation Choices for Maryland (3 bills):</b>          In a time of scarce transportation dollars, we need to make sure we are investing state funds wisely. SB 760 will establish smart growth criteria for funding transportation projects to make it easy for the state to choose proposals that ensure our transportation and land use decisions work together to provide more travel choices to Maryland citizens, especially for those who do not own cars. It will also reduce environmental damage from transportation projects and improve access to jobs. The other bills will make the roads safer for bicycling.</p>
	<p><b>SB 686: Watershed Protection and Restoration Act</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Raskin</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <b><i>SUPPORT</i></b>          In order to restore the health of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed, each city and county throughout the region needs funding to invest in its community to reduce the polluted runoff poisoning our waterways. This legislation will give these local jurisdictions a dedicated funding source by assessing a surcharge on impervious surfaces to clean up their rivers and the Bay, create green jobs, and leverage additional dollars from the state and federal government for watershed protection and restoration.</p>

<p><b>Maryland LCV Priority</b></p> <p><b>NEW THIS WEEK</b></p>	<p><b>SB 420: Stormwater Management</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Colburn</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <i><b>OPPOSE</b></i></p> <p><b>SB 1082: Stormwater Management</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator DeGrange</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Assigned to Rules</b>  <i><b>OPPOSE</b></i></p> <p>We oppose any rollbacks to the Stormwater Management regulations. Stormwater is the ONLY pollution source INCREASING loads to the Bay and its rivers. If we want healthy water, we have to step up reductions from development and redevelopment. Builders worry about their costs of meeting treatment requirements; however, it will cost more to retrofit after the fact. Developers can share the burden now, or taxpayers can foot the entire bill later. The regulations work as written since they allow ample flexibility for redevelopment projects to meet requirements in any number of ways.</p>
<p><b>Maryland LCV Priority</b></p>	<p><b>SB 910: Comprehensive Energy Planning</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Lenett</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 17 at 1pm in Finance and Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs</b>  <i><b>SUPPORT</b></i></p> <p>Requires the Department of Planning to oversee the creation of a state energy plan that is consistent with all state environmental laws and requires the Public Service Commission to review proposals from energy companies with respect to the state plan and environmental laws such as the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Act.</p>

	<p><b>SB 95: Maryland Agricultural Land Preservation Foundation - Farmland Preservation Partnership</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Carter Conway (By Request of the Department of Agriculture)</b>  <b>Floor Action: Passed Third Reader 47-0, Assigned Environmental Matters</b>  <i><b>SUPPORT</b></i></p> <p>Establishes a Farmland Preservation Partnership Program to preserve productive agricultural and forested lands; forms partnerships to purchase easements that meet specified criteria.</p>
	<p><b>SB 224: Solar Drying Bill</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator King</b>  <b>Floor Action: Passed Third Reader 47-0</b>  <i><b>SUPPORT</b></i></p> <p>Removes the prohibition of clotheslines or other outdoor laundry drying devices, but would allow condominiums, homeowners associations or housing cooperatives to adopt reasonable rules regarding the timing, placement, and manner of use of these devices.</p>

	<p><b>SB 229: Blue Ribbon Commission on Maryland Transportation Funding</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Garagiola</b>  <b>Floor Action: Passed Third Reader 47-0</b>  <b>SUPPORT</b>  Establish a Blue Ribbon Commission to review, evaluate, and make recommendations on Maryland Transportation Funding.</p>
	<p><b>SB 235: Mobile Home Parks - Plans for Dislocated Residents</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Robey</b>  <b>Committee Action: Favorable Report by Judicial Proceedings</b>  <b>SUPPORT</b>  This is a smart growth measure that requires better land use planning for the relocation of dislocated residents of mobile parks to encourage the continuation of their community.</p>
	<p><b>SB 355: Net Energy Metering</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Pinsky</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Favorable Report with Amendments by Finance</b>  <b>SUPPORT</b></p> <p><b>SB 537: Net Energy Metering Credit Transfers</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Mooney</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Unfavorable Report by Finance, Withdrawn</b>  <b>SUPPORT</b></p> <p><b>Net Metering (2 bills) -</b> SB 355 requires utilities to pay customers back for surplus energy they create with the solar panels on their roofs. SB 537 allows specified not-for-profit customers to transfer specified generation credits accrued from electricity produced from specified renewable sources to specified properties. These incentives will create a more robust market for energy generation.</p>

	<p><b>SB 20: Bay Restoration Fund - Authorized Uses</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Colburn</b>  <b>Committee Action: Recommit to Education, Health and Environmental Affairs</b>  <b>SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS</b>  Reduces pollution by authorizing the Bay Restoration Fund to pay the cost of connecting properties served by onsite sewage disposal systems to existing municipal wastewater facilities.</p>
	<p><b>SB 29: Preparation of Fishery Management Plans</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Astle</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Third Reader Passed 47-0, Assigned to Environmental Matters</b>  <b>SUPPORT</b>  The Task Force on Fisheries Management recommended this legislation that authorizes the Department of Natural Resources to develop fishery management plans for species in need as identified by the Department in addition to the 24 species already listed in statute. State agencies and commissions managing fisheries in the mid-Atlantic region, including Virginia, Delaware, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and North Carolina, already hold this authority.</p>

	<p><b>SB 37: Oysters – Patent Tongs and Power Dredges</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Colburn</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <i><b>OPPOSE</b></i>  Prohibits the Department of Natural Resources from prohibiting the use of patent tongs and power dredges to catch oysters in the waters of the state, providing for the application of a specified provision of the Act, and making stylistic changes.</p>
	<p><b>SB 63: Transit-Oriented Development - Pledge and Use of Tax Increment Revenues – Operations and Maintenance Funding</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Currie (By Request of the Department of Transportation)</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <i><b>SUPPORT</b></i>  Provides more flexibility to distribute funds to encourage investment in transit-oriented development, encouraging smart growth and sustainable communities.</p>
	<p><b>SB 155: Estate Tax Exclusion for Family Farm in Preservation</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Glassman</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <i><b>SUPPORT</b></i></p> <p><b>SB 592: Estate Tax Exclusion for Qualified Agricultural Property</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Garagiola</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 10 at 1pm in Budget and Taxation</b>  <i><b>SUPPORT</b></i></p> <p><b>SB 790: Estate Tax Exclusions for Family Farms Subject to Agricultural Preservation Easements</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Garagiola</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 10 at 1pm in Budget and Taxation</b>  <i><b>SUPPORT</b></i></p> <p><b>Keep Farmers Farming (3 bills)</b> - Many farm families are forced off their land when the parents die because of the burden of estate taxes; we support full relief for farmers from this tax. But in these fiscal times, we also support partial relief for those farmers who go the extra mile and preserve their property. Keeping farmers farming promotes smart growth and protects our open spaces.</p>
	<p><b>SB 156: Apartment Building Recycling</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Brochin</b>  <b>Committee Action: Unfavorable Report by Education, Health and Environmental Affairs</b>  <i><b>SUPPORT</b></i>  Requires owners or managers of apartment buildings or condominiums that contain 10 or more dwelling units to provide recycling for residents on or before October 1, 2014.</p>
	<p><b>SB 215: High Performance Building Act</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Frosh</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <i><b>SUPPORT</b></i>  Expands the High Performance Buildings Act requiring LEED Silver Standard for capital projects that are funded solely or partly by a grant of state aid.</p>

	<p><b>SB 228: Conditions for Issuance</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Mooney</b>  <b>Committee Action: Unfavorable Report by Education, Health and Environmental Affairs</b>  <b><i>SUPPORT</i></b></p> <p><b>SB 514: Limitations on Issuance</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Lenett</b>  <b>Committee Action: Unfavorable Report by Education Health, and Environmental Affairs</b>  <b><i>SUPPORT</i></b></p> <p><b>Incinerator Regulation (2 bills)</b> - These bills establish important criteria for the building, re-licensing, or re-permitting of any incinerator or waste-to-energy facility.</p>
	<p><b>SB 277: Renewable Energy Portfolio Standard – Solar</b>  <b>Sponsor: President Miller (By Request of Governor O’Malley)</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <b><i>SUPPORT</i></b></p> <p>Require a quicker ramp-up of the solar portion of the state’s renewable portfolio standard (RPS), which would jump-start job creation and cut down on our emission of global warming pollution.</p>
	<p><b>SB 282: Qualified Submerged Energy Lines</b>  <b>Sponsor: President Miller (By Request of Governor O’Malley)</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard in Finance; Re-assigned jointly to Education, Health and Environmental Affairs</b>  <b><i>SUPPORT</i></b></p> <p>This bill would help facilitate development of offshore wind energy off the coast of Maryland.</p>
	<p><b>SB 285: Sustainable Communities Act</b>  <b>Sponsor: President Miller (By Request of Governor O’Malley)</b>  <b>Committee Action: Already Heard</b>  <b><i>SUPPORT</i></b></p> <p>Reestablishes and alters the Maryland Heritage Structure Rehabilitation Tax Credit Program (a.k.a., the Historic Tax Credit) to be the Sustainable Communities Tax Credit Program.</p>
	<p><b>SB 311: Chesapeake Conservation Corps</b>  <b>Sponsors: Senators Miller and Klausmeier</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <b><i>SUPPORT WITH AMMENDMENTS</i></b></p> <p>The bill would establish a public-private volunteer service-based program that will train young adults for green-collar and community organizing jobs in environmental restoration, protection, energy conservation and education.</p>
	<p><b>SB 342: Natural Resources - Oyster Poaching – Hearing</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Frosh</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 9 at 1pm in Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs</b>  <b><i>SUPPORT</i></b></p> <p>This bill complements the Governor's oyster initiative by directing DNR to conduct an administrative hearing for anyone who receives a citation for oyster poaching.</p>
	<p><b>SB 350: Transit-Oriented Development - Expansion of Geographic Area</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Currie</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Cancelled</b>  <b><i>OPPOSE</i></b></p> <p>Expands the geographic area within which a specified project could qualify as a transit-oriented development (TOD). This would weaken TOD, a targeted smart growth program, and would steer precious resources to less efficient locations.</p>

	<p><b>SB 359: Fertilizer and Pesticide Reporting</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Lenett</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  Mandates tracking and geographic mapping of fertilizer and pesticide use.</p>
	<p><b>SB 455: Maryland Efficiency Standards Act – Televisions</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Pinsky</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  Saves energy and reduces global warming pollution by establishing minimum efficiency standards for televisions sold in Maryland.</p>
	<p><b>SB 462: Chesapeake Bay Restoration Consumer Retail Choice Act</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Raskin</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 10 at 1pm in Finance</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  Reduces waste and energy demands by establishing a customer credit for using reusable bags instead of disposable bags and establishing a fee on the use of disposable bags. A significant portion of the fee will go to the Chesapeake and Atlantic Coastal Bays 2010 Trust Fund.</p>
	<p><b>SB 464: Marilyn J. Praisner Safe and Earth-Friendly Roadway Act</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Forehand</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  This bill authorizes local jurisdictions to install safer, more energy efficient road lamps.</p>
	<p><b>SB 504: Lead Paint Dust Testing Bill</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Gladden</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  This bill ensures that rental properties are tested for the presence of lead containing dust instead of the current visual testing method. This will help eliminate childhood lead poisoning.</p>
	<p><b>SB 513: No-Discharge Designation for Maryland Waters</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Carter Conway (At the Request of the Attorney General)</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 16 at 1pm in Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  Reduces nutrient pollution by prohibiting boats from discharging treated and untreated sewage into the waters of the state.</p>
	<p><b>SB 515: The Renewables First Act</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Lenett</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Unfavorable Report by Finance</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  Requires that Maryland first consider renewable energy for new electricity generation.</p>
	<p><b>SB 558: Long-Term Power Purchasing Agreements</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Pinsky</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Unfavorable Report by Finance</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  Requires the Public Service Commission to enter into long-term purchasing contracts with renewable energy sources.</p>

	<p><b>SB 566: Direct Wine Shipping</b>  <b>Sponsors: Senators Raskin and Pugh</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 17 at 1pm in Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs</b>  The bill supports sustainable farming practices and maintaining Maryland’s farms and open spaces by promoting the sale of a growing agricultural product –Maryland wine. This bill would allow both wineries and retailers to ship up to 24 cases of wine to a Maryland resident per year.</p>
	<p><b>SB 569: Biomass and Biofuels - In-State Production Incentives</b>  <b>Sponsors: Senator Middleton</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 9 at 1pm in Finance</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  Allows farmers to receive revenue for surplus energy produced with biofuels and requires blending biofuels into transportation fuels to provide energy independence and cleaner water.</p>
	<p><b>SB 653: Keep Coal Ash Out of Our Water</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Lenett</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  Prohibits certain uses of coal ash, a byproduct of coal fired power plants, and adds stricter requirements to prevent toxic dust from poisoning our waters.</p>
	<p><b>SB 656: Public Building Energy Disclosure</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Lenett</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 11 at 1pm in Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p><b>SB 713: Public and Commercial Buildings Energy Disclosure</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Lenett</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 9 at 1pm in Finance</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p><b>SB 952: Residential Home Sales</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Carter Conway</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 25 at 1pm in Judicial Proceedings</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i></p> <p><b>Energy Disclosure (3 bills) -</b> SB 656 requires that all government buildings publicly disclose building energy use; SB 713 adds an additional requirement for commercial building owners; and SB 952 requires residential homeowners to publically disclose utility use at time of listing.</p>
	<p><b>SB 720: Clean Energy Loans</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Middleton</b>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 9 at 1pm in Finance</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  Gives cities and municipalities the ability to loan citizens money for solar or energy efficiency projects at very low interest rates, resulting in more access for homeowners.</p>
	<p><b>SB 775: Road Salt Management Programs</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Kramer</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  <b>Committee Hearing: Already Heard</b>  Road salt can have a significant impact in our streams. This bill requires jurisdictions responsible for highway maintenance to establish and implement a best practices road salt management program.</p>

	<p><b>SB 859: Arsenic in Chicken Feed</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Pinsky</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>  <b>Committee Hearing: March 16 at 1pm in Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs</b>          Prohibiting a person from using, selling, or distributing poultry feed that contains roxarsone or any other additive that contains arsenic.</p>
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## GOOD GOVERNANCE BILLS

Open transparent government is critical to the Maryland LCV’s mission of holding legislators accountable. Therefore, we are tracking the following good governance bills this session:

	<p><b>SB 407: Maryland Open Government Act</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator King</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>          Requires all standing committee votes be posted and accessible on the Maryland General Assembly website; requires additional measures to enable more public participation in General Assembly and Board of Public Works hearings.</p>

	<p><b>HB 89/SB 3: Wetlands and Waterways Program Fees</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Klausmeier</b>  <b>HB 89 Floor Action: Passed Third Reader on House Floor 138-0, Assigned to Education, Health and Environmental Affairs</b>  <b>SB 3 Floor Action: Passed Third Reader 42-0, Assigned to Environmental Matters</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>          Exempting aquaculture activities for which the Department of Natural Resources has issued a specified permit from a requirement to pay application fees under the Wetlands and Waterways Program.</p>
	<p><b>HB 33/SB 213: Child Care Articles and Toys Containing Bisphenol-A (“BPA”)</b>  <b>Sponsor: Senator Frosh</b>  <b>HB 33 Floor Action: Passed Third Reader on House Floor 137-0, Assigned to Finance</b>  <b>SB 213 Floor Action: Passed Third Reader 46-0, Assigned to Health &amp; Government Operations</b>  <i>SUPPORT</i>          Prohibits the manufacture, sale or distribution of toys or child care articles containing BPA, requiring the use of the least toxic alternative.</p>
