<p><u>SB 383</u> - MARYLAND LCV PRIORITY State Transfer Tax - Distribution of Revenue This bill rolls in the priorities from HB1464 (Gaines): Program Open Space Trust Fund Act of 2016. It outlines that full cash funding for Program Open Space that will start in 2019, with all repayments completed by 2029 – by which time the program will have \$270 million more than it would have received with no bill. Lead and mercury weights are used in the auto industry market to balance tires of vehicles. At the end of a vehicle's life, they can fall off tires and then break down and contaminate soil, wash into sewers and local waterways, or end up being transported to municipal landfills and incinerators.</p>	<p>Lam; S.
